The stage risers will be moved from the stage to the Primary Playground next week where our Holiday Performances will be held. Upstairs teachers may need to adjust your line up spots accordingly if they are in your normal spot. I'll have two sound systems handy to test which one works best while you're rehearsing next week.

You probably noticed that the Auditorium is decorated for a holiday performance. This is for the Band/Orchestra performance on Tues, Dec 20 at 6pm. They're able to perform inside because the concert is outside of school hours and the rules for requiring and checking vaccination apply to events held during school hours, but not after school.

It's been a few years since we've hosted a Santa Claus visit and after much thought, I've decided to cancel this schoowide practice based on a few factors:

- Balancing Christmas with Other Winter Holidays-You all do a great job of incorporating stories, art, lessons, and activities highlighting customs from Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, Las Posadas, Winter Solstice, etc as part of your instruction to teach about traditions from diverse cultures and people of different backgrounds. Teaching about Christmas traditions should be included in this, however a visit from Santa Claus disproportionately celebrates Christmas compared to other holidays.
- Consideration for What Students Already Know and Experience-I am confident that the majority, if not all, our students already know about Santa, have experiences visiting with Santa outside of school, and do not rely on a school-provided Santa visit. If families wish to have a Santa visit, there are many opportunities to do so outside of school.
- Many Other Ways to Teach About Traditions-As you talk about and do activities to teach about diverse holiday experiences, there are many ways to include Christmas traditions in a similar manner to how you teach about other holidays. A visit from Santa, while joyful, does not teach students anything new about holiday traditions.

If you disagree with my decision and feel strongly about hosting a visit in your class, you need to arrange a visit from someone (community member, parent/family member, etc) who can speak about traditions of other holidays to balance a visit with Santa. If you need help with this, let me know. If you plan to do this, please notify me before next Fri, Dec 16.

Hi Bethany,

Thanks for reaching out about this. It's correct that I have discontinued the practice of a schoolwide Santa visit but there's a bit more context that is important to know.

Teachers are still encouraged to teach about holiday for traditions for Christmas, Hanukkah, Las Posadas, Kwanzaa, etc and all winter holidays. The change of not bringing Santa from class to class is to create balance so that we are not highlighting Christmas over other winter holidays. However, teachers can still talk about, read stories about, do activities/art, etc about Santa similarly to what they do for other holidays.

Additionally, teachers who feel strongly about hosting a Santa visit can still do so, they just need to also host someone else (parent, community member, etc) who can talk about another holiday tradition.

This ensures that we are teaching about holiday traditions without elevating one holiday over any others. If you have any questions about this, let me know and I'm

happy to speak with you and Will further.

Hi Jenny,

Thanks for sharing your thoughts. I know my decision has frustrated some individuals and although that wasn't my intention, traditions, both family and school, are very personal to us.

I put a lot of thought into my decision and don't plan to change it, but I can share more about how I made it and hopefully answer your questions. I'll also share that things like this are often best addressed by speaking in person, so I'm happy to meet with you and Kevin to talk more, if you'd like. We do lots of great things in classrooms to highlight a variety of cultures and holiday traditions around this time of year ranging from stories and art to lessons and discussions. However, bringing Santa to each class elevates Christmas above other holidays that are also happening at this time of year. I agree that Santa is generally accepted as a cultural figure and not a religious one, but he specifically represents Christmas, not Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, etc. We still teach about Christmas traditions including Santa with stories, activities, art, writing, etc, but it must be done in a way that balances other holiday traditions from this time of year.

This is also why teachers who feel strongly about Santa visiting their classrooms can still do so, there just needs to be someone else representing another holiday who can come and talk about those traditions. That creates the balance we are aiming for. This doesn't need to occur on the same day/time and it doesn't need to be an official representative of another religion. A community member, student, sibling, parent, etc who can talk about traditions from Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, Winter Solstice, Las Posadas, Boxing Day, etc meets this criteria. However, this is each teacher's decision, not a decision made by parents from the class. We trust our teachers to know what their students need every day and to supplement curriculum with activities and lessons as needed and this is no different.

I also took into consideration students' existing knowledge of and experience with Santa compared to other cultural celebrations we've highlighted during the year such as Lunar New Year and Diwali. Most of our students first learn about Lunar New Year, Diwali, etc because of the lessons our teachers deliver and the celebrations we discuss at school. Most, if not all students already know who Santa is, what he does, and what he represents without us teaching anything about him. E ven without Santa visiting, he and other Christmas traditions are absolutely present in class activities. We are not disregarding Santa as an important tradition or removing Christmas from the celebrations we highlight. We are balancing it with other celebrations by not highlighting Santa and Christmas above the others.

I agree with you that Santa and all the holidays that are celebrated in the Winter are joyful and fun, but I don't think an in-person Santa visit is the only or even the best way to spread that joy. Many of the children in our community do not celebrate Christmas and I don't believe their holiday is any less joyful. None of the other ten elementary schools in BUSD have a Santa visit and I don't believe the students who attend those schools are any less joyful than ours (though I DO think Deserval to the bast, just not because of a Santa visit (a)

DO think Roosevelt is the best...just not because of a Santa visit 6.

For those who celebrate Christmas and for anyone who wants to learn more about or experience Christmas traditions, Santa visits are available in Burbank and throughout the region...some are free and some require payment, but anyone can access them.

I don't think the classes who aren't visited by Santa will feel unworthy or not-as-good-as-others and I know the teachers who make that decision are highlighting a range of holiday traditions in lots of other ways.

I understand that my reasons may not change you point-of-view anymore than your reasons have changed my mind, but I want you to know that know I really thought about this a lot and although I keep coming back to the same decision, I'm sorry for the frustration, anger, and hurt feelings it has caused during an otherwise joyful season.

Again, I'm happy to meet to talk more.

Dear Mr. Osmond,

I have waited a few days since I heard about your decision about Santa to write so I could process it all In the best way possible.

I understand that your decision is under what you feel is best, but I disagree. I feel like adult agendas are getting in the way of the magic and joy of childhood and we all need to take a step back and learn to celebrate the goodness that can happen during the holidays.

First, by not allowing Santa at all because of a few kids who do not celebrate, I think it would be a good way for them to get to experience the tradition. Learning about different traditions is good for everyone.

Our kids are given the opportunities to experience Native American traditions, Hispanic traditions, and others with assemblies throughout the year. What is the difference with Santa as a tradition? Santa is not religious (although I do agree it follows the tradition of giving gifts as the wise men do in Christianity, but Santa does not have any affiliation with the Baby Jesus or the Christmas story). It should not bother anyone of a different tradition as in that it does not come from the Bible or mention anything from the Bible. I know plenty of other families of different religions that incorporate Santa even though they are not Christian.

It can be a learning experience as the Kwanza assembly was several years ago for our kids that do not celebrate Kwanza. I wasn't upset by that celebration and I do not think anyone else would be upset by Santa either. If our kids get the opportunity to experience different traditions, can't those that do not celebrate have the same experiences with Santa being the "new" tradition to learn about?

Take, for instance, the Ofrenda. It is a wonderful celebration for Day of the Dead. However, it is a RELIGIOUS tradition of Aztecs that celebrates the afterlife. Although it is very different because Santa is not religious, how is that okay but Santa is not? They are both celebrations where people can learn about different traditions. You cannot use Santa as a religious excuse when you have the Ofrenda, or Kwanza celebrations, or a Menorah in the front office. Having Santa is very different than having a priest or Rabbi talking about their religion. I think it is wonderful for our kids to celebrate all traditions, but that means ALL and not just those that are in the minority. EVERYONE should have the chance to learn something new....so why can't Santa be used at the "something new" for those children?

I understand that you have given the teachers the opportunity to have Santa on their own if they choose. I feel like Santa "picking and choosing" which kids are good or which classrooms to visit is going to cause a lot more childhood heartache when one class gets Santa and the other class does not. You might have 2 or 3 that do not think Santa Is a good idea but think about the masses of kids who are heartbroken when some classes get Santa and others do not. (I take this from a similar childhood experience of my own when I was broken because Santa came to see a friend and not me in a similar situation when I was in elementary school.) Think about the magic this takes away from some children. Or the magic It can give ALL children. It also puts the teachers in a really bad situation on having to choose between what they know you want and what their kids want. In addition, on a logistical note, you could end up with multiple Santas coming to the

school at the same time for different classes - which is not only confusing but when ONE Santa could visit everyone, isn't it better to have less visitors in the school?

These are just my thoughts. It is my understanding that Santa is being arranged for some classrooms. I desperately hope they can all be included. It will be terrible for some of the kids (especially the 5th graders) to get Santa on their last magical elementary year and the others are left out. Can't they ALL have some magic in their lives? Haven't they lost enough over the last few years? Can we please have some childhood JOY?

We all need to step back and celebrate the joy of childhood and guit finding reasons why innocent, wonderful, celebrations are offensive and therefore not allowed. I honestly believe that there is not a single person who wants to stop the magic of the holiday season regardless of what they celebrate or not. I honestly believe all parents want their children to have magic and joy in their lives. We need to stop these personal adult agendas trying to prove something and just let joy in instead. We need to celebrate EVERYONE! (And that includes SANTA!)

Thanks for sharing your thoughts. I can clarify a few things to be sure the information you have is accurate, however if you'd like to speak about this, just let me know and I can give you a call or set up time to meet.

I made the decision to discontinue a schoolwlde Santa visit because this practice elevated Christmas above other winter holidays. To be clear, we are still teaching about Christmas traditions, including Santa, as well as Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, etc. Using similar activities like stories, art activities, etc ensures we balance all of these without favoring one over others.

When I explained my decision to our teachers, I let them know that if they feel strongly about including a visit with Santa, there should also be someone else who can speak about another holiday tradition to create the same balance. This doesn't need to occur on the same day/time because we're not comparing two holidays (for example some classes are doing something this week and have a visit with Santa next Fri). It also doesn't need to be an official representative of another religion because we are not teaching religion, we are teaching about traditions and customs. Some classes have a family member or a parent from the class coming in to speak about another tradition, such as making latkes or playing with dreidel. We are not equating Santa with any religious figures. We are working to balance holiday celebrations.

Similarly, when we teach about Dia de los Muertos or Diwali, we are not spreading religion but are instead teaching about customs and traditions. The issue isn't really about creating further separation between church and school because we already create that separation by teaching about traditions, not spreading or promoting religions. My decision is about not favoring one religion's traditions over others and recognizing different holidays that occur at the same time in a similar manner.

While you may still disagree with my decision, I hope this helps to explain how I came to it and clarifies some of the misinformation you may have heard.

I'm prepping for a meeting that starts in about an hour and a half and probably can't meet today, but I've been very clear with everyone who has expressed disappointment or had questions that this was absolutely a principal decision and not something that our DEi committee did or should be blamed for. Angle has been great about telling parents who disagree or who have questions to contact me. Here are a few other bulleted talking points as well as an email I sent that explains my decision process:

- I told teachers that we are discontinuing the schoolwide Santa visit, but that if they'd like to have a Santa visit in their class, they need to have someone (parent, family, community member, student, etc) come to speak about another holiday tradition other than Christmas. It doesn't need to be on the same day, just someone who can talk about something else. Kathy Wills' husband, Barry, did two presentations today for about 7 different classes about Hanukkah that was fantastic.
- We are not "cancelling Christmas". We are still doing lots and lots of activities about Christmas as well as other holidays. My decision is to ensure we are balancing all of them and not elevating Christmas above others.
- None of the other 10 elementary schools in Burbank have a Santa visit.

You are welcome to respond with your personal views about this decision, but I am also concerned about backlash onto DEI committee and encourage you to also make sure people know this was my decision, not DEI committees and that they should reach out to me if they'd like to know more.

Here's an email I sent with a bit more info:

Hi XXXXX,

Thanks for sharing your thoughts. I know my decision has frustrated some individuals and although that wasn't my intention, traditions, both family and school, are very personal to us.

I put a lot of thought into my decision and don't plan to change it, but I can share more about how I made it and hopefully answer your questions. I'll also share that things like this are often best addressed by speaking in person, so I'm happy to meet with you and XXXXXX to talk more, if you'd like.

We do lots of great things in classrooms to highlight a variety of cultures and holiday traditions around this time of year ranging from stories and art to lessons and discussions. However, bringing Santa to each class elevates Christmas above other holidays that are also happening at this time of year. I agree that Santa is generally accepted as a cultural figure and not a religious one, but he specifically represents Christmas, not Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, etc. We still teach about Christmas traditions including Santa with stories, activities, art, writing, etc, but it must be done in a way that balances other holiday traditions from this time of year.

This is also why teachers who feel strongly about Santa visiting their classrooms can still do so, there just needs to be someone else representing another holiday who can come and talk about

those traditions. That creates the balance we are aiming for. This doesn't need to occur on the same day/time and it doesn't need to be an official representative of another religion. A community member, student, sibling, parent, etc who can talk about traditions from Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, Winter Solstice, Las Posadas, Boxing Day, etc meets this criteria. However, this is each teacher's decision, not a decision made by parents from the class. We trust our teachers to know what their students need every day and to supplement curriculum with activities and lessons as needed and this is no different.

I also took into consideration students' existing knowledge of and experience with Santa compared to other cultural celebrations we've highlighted during the year such as Lunar New Year and Diwali. Most of our students first learn about Lunar New Year, Diwali, etc because of the lessons our teachers deliver and the celebrations we discuss at school. Most, if not all students already know who Santa is, what he does, and what he represents without us teaching anything about him. Even without Santa visiting, he and other Christmas traditions are absolutely present in class activities. We are not disregarding Santa as an important tradition or removing Christmas from the celebrations we highlight. We are balancing it with other celebrations by not highlighting Santa and Christmas above the others.

I agree with you that Santa and all the holidays that are celebrated in the Winter are joyful and fun, but I don't think an in-person Santa visit is the only or even the best way to spread that joy. Many of the children in our community do not celebrate Christmas and I don't believe their holiday is any less joyful. None of the other ten elementary schools in BUSD have a Santa visit and I don't believe the students who attend those schools are any less joyful than ours (though I

DO think Roosevelt is the best...just not because of a Santa visit (2).

For those who celebrate Christmas and for anyone who wants to learn more about or experience Christmas traditions, Santa visits are available in Burbank and throughout the region...some are free and some require payment, but anyone can access them.

I don't think the classes who aren't visited by Santa will feel unworthy or not-as-good-as-others and I know the teachers who make that decision are highlighting a range of holiday traditions in lots of other ways.

I understand that my reasons may not change you point-of-view any more than your reasons have changed my mind, but I want you to know that know I really thought about this a lot and although I keep coming back to the same decision, I'm sorry for the frustration, anger, and hurt feelings it has caused during an otherwise joyful season.

Again, I'm happy to meet to talk more.

The parent who emailed Emily had some misinformation and if you'd like I can address it with Emily, if that's appropriate.

In the past, it was really just a visit they did for fun. We haven't done it since Dec 2019 and I discontinued it this year because it elevated Christmas above other Winter Holidays. I explained to teachers that if they felt strongly about a visit, they needed to balance that by having someone (student, community member, family member, parent, etc) come talk about traditions from a non-Christmas celebration.

We've been careful to ensure neither the Santa visit nor the other presentations teach religion and instead teach customs and traditions. The Santa visits also discuss the tradition and often accompany readings of stories like <u>The Grinch</u>, <u>The Polar Express</u>, etc.

Out of 23 classroom teachers, there are 11 who have opted into a Santa visit. 8 of them coordinated an assembly yesterday where someone came and presented about traditions connected with Hanukkah (latkes, menorah, dreidel) and have a planned visit with Santa next Fri. The other 3 are doing so next week and have a planned visit with Santa next Wed.

I had pushback from two teachers who felt I was either ruining Christmas or favoring non-Christian traditions over Christian. I've had either conversations or emails with 7 parents who also disagree for the same reasons.

Here's the email I sent to staff about it (first two paragraphs are unrelated):

Mr. Osmond,

I know Jake already spoke to you and you already know where we stand on this Santa issue. While I would have loved to see Santa not be politicized and seen this be a unifying experience, that's simply not going to happen. That's not why I'm writing this letter to you today. I am writing to share with you the survey I have had the opportunity to hear from the people in the school that you serve. This Santa issue is a symptom of a bigger problem we have, and if we don't treat it soon, our school is in danger.

Your teachers are hurt, angry and upset. just you making this decision alone has caused a divide amongst friends and coworkers. Rather than bringing them together on this and asking them, you told them. Leadership should never look like this. This decision has made teachers that feel the opposite of your opinion have to jump through hoops to uphold a tradition we have had at this school since long before you were even a Burbank employee. I'm sure you already know teachers everywhere are dissatisfied in the workplace, and Roosevelt teachers are not immune to this. They are tired, they don't feel their opinions matter or are heard, and they don't feel valued. As a parent, this frightens me. I have felt for a long time that the Burbank schools are failing us and our teachers deserve better. You must do better. So much of their job can't change. Behavior issues, funding, Covid even... but how their boss treats them can.

The other people I have had the opportunity to hear from are other parents. Many of them have different core beliefs than myself. Some parents confess they aren't surprised at all that you would
over complicate this matter and instead of surveying the families you serve, you did what you wanted. Most parents are dumbfounded that the obvious choice to allow all children the opportunity to see Santa was made. "It doesn't make sense." That is what most parents are saying. And I think the saddest part of all, is that majority of parents don't even have the chance to form an opinion, which is what I know you are hiding behind. You don't want all the parents to know that their class won't have Santa because then you would have to answer to so many more upset parents. See, the problem with this is, you are taking away personal choice from families. That is not leadership. It Is not public service. It's totalitarianism.

The last group of people I have had the chance to observe is the children that you oversee. These kids don't need adult opinions jading their view on life. Simple childhood memories don't need to be clouded with thoughts of exclusion. And sadly, the playground next week will be full of sad children wondering why Santa didn't come to their classroom. And the answer is because their principal made a rash decision and instead of reversing it made teachers decide between being in the right standing with their boss or jumping through hoops by getting more volunteers and collecting funds the PTA could have done.

All of this said, thank you for continuing to answer emails, thank you even, for overthinking decisions, because I still like to think you care so much. But while we are all human and make mistakes, I pray that you will learn from this one. I pray that you find a way to honor all teachers' opinions and help them feel safe and valued in their workplace. I have been a parent at Roosevelt for 7 years and have 6 more ahead of me. I pray that the years ahead are not filled with teachers giving up hope and slipping into this being just a job. I pray we don't lose the experienced ones to retiring early or others leaving for a district that values them.

I don't need a response, because I am not asking any questions that need direct answers. I'm just asking you to reflect on some of the points I am bringing up. Merry Christmas and I hope you have a restful weekend before next week's festivities. -Alexa Brodsky

You probably noticed that the Auditorium is decorated for a holiday performance. This is for the Band/Orchestra performance <u>on Tues</u>, <u>Dec 20 at 6pm</u>. They're able to perform inside because the concert is outside of school hours and the rules for requiring and checking vaccination apply to events held during school hours, but not after school.

It's been a few years since we've hosted a Santa Claus visit and after much thought, I've decided to discontinue this schoowide practice based on a few factors:

- Balancing Christmas with Other Winter Holidays-You all do a great job of incorporating stories, art, lessons, and activities highlighting customs from Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, Las Posadas, Winter Solstice, etc as part of your instruction to teach about traditions from diverse cultures and people of different backgrounds. Teaching about Christmas traditions should be included in this, however a visit from Santa Claus disproportionately celebrates Christmas compared to other holidays.
- Consideration for What Students Already Know and Experience-I am confident that the majority, if not all, our students already know about Santa, have experiences visiting with Santa outside of school, and do not rely on a school-provided Santa visit. If families wish to have a Santa visit, there are many opportunities to do so outside of school.
- Many Other Ways to Teach About Traditions-As you talk about and do
 activities to teach about diverse holiday experiences, there are many ways to
 include Christmas traditions in a similar manner to how you teach about other

holidays. A visit from Santa, while joyful, does not teach students anything new about holiday traditions.

Over the past two weeks, I have received a number of inquiries about a visit by Santa. Complaints have been registered about Santa being a religious character and the lack of equal time to other religions and special observations during this holiday season. These concerns surround disproportionally celebrating Christmas in relation to other Winter holiday observations.

In consideration of these concerns, about half of the staff felt that the school should forego the practice of having a visit by Santa. I also checked with other Burbank elementary schools and no other school has this practice of hosting Santa visits. Additionally, I consulted with District leadership and they concurred with the decision to forego a visit by Santa. Therefore, we will not be hosting a visit from Santa.

I've copied Matt if you would like more info. Here is a summary from him.

In the past, it was really just a visit they did for fun. We haven't done it since Dec 2019 and I discontinued it this year because it elevated Christmas above other Winter Holidays. I explained to teachers that if they felt strongly about a visit, they needed to balance that by having someone (student, community member, family member, parent, etc) come talk about traditions from a non-Christmas celebration.

We've been careful to ensure neither the Santa visit nor the other presentations teach religion and instead teach customs and traditions. The Santa visits also discuss the tradition and often accompany readings of stories like <u>The Grinch</u>, <u>The Polar Express</u>, etc.

Out of 23 classroom teachers, there are 11 who have opted into a Santa visit. 8 of them coordinated an assembly yesterday where someone came and presented about traditions connected with Hanukkah (latkes, menorah, dreidel) and have a planned visit with Santa <u>next</u> <u>Fri.</u> The other 3 are doing so next week and have a planned visit with Santa <u>next Wed.</u>

I had pushback from two teachers who felt I was either ruining Christmas or favoring non-Christian traditions over Christian. I've had either conversations or emails with 7 parents who also disagree for the same reasons.

Here's the email I sent to staff about it (first two paragraphs are unrelated):

Hi All,

The stage risers will be moved from the stage to the Primary Playground next week where our Holiday Performances will be held. Upstairs teachers may need to adjust your line up spots accordingly if they are in your normal spot. I'll have two sound systems handy to test which one works best while you're rehearsing next week.

You probably noticed that the Auditorium is decorated for a holiday performance. This is for the Band/Orchestra performance <u>on Tues, Dec 20 at 6pm</u>. They're able to perform inside because the concert is outside of school hours and the rules for requiring and checking vaccination apply to events held during school hours, but not after school.

It's been a few years since we've hosted a Santa Claus visit and after much thought, I've decided to discontinue this schoowide practice based on a few factors:

- Balancing Christmas with Other Winter Holidays-You all do a great job of incorporating stories, art, lessons, and activities highlighting customs from Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, Las Posadas, Winter Solstice, etc as part of your instruction to teach about traditions from diverse cultures and people of different backgrounds. Teaching about Christmas traditions should be included in this, however a visit from Santa Claus disproportionately celebrates Christmas compared to other holidays.
- Consideration for What Students Already Know and Experience-I am confident that the majority, if not all, our students already know about Santa, have experiences visiting with Santa outside of school, and do not rely on a school-provided Santa visit. If families wish to have a Santa visit, there are many opportunities to do so outside of school.
- Many Other Ways to Teach About Traditions-As you talk about and do activities to teach about diverse holiday experiences, there are many ways to include Christmas traditions in a similar manner to how you teach about other holidays. A visit from Santa, while joyful, does not teach students anything new about holiday traditions.

If you feel strongly about hosting a Santa visit in your class, you need to arrange a visit from someone (community member, parent/family member, etc) who can speak about traditions of other holidays to balance a visit with Santa. If you need help with this, let me know.

Matt,

I'm sure you are expecting notes like this in reply, but I feel compelled to voice my opinion here. I would like to preface this by saying I do not envy your position as a decision-maker, and I hear very clearly that you have not taken this lightly. Still, I add my perspective here, in order to make clear what I think is wrong.

First and foremost, I think this is a poor decision, not as much in substance as in timing. It would be one thing to have an up front policy that does not allow Santa visits. I think it is another thing entirely to put a stop to something that has already been planned and announced to children, some of whom may have been looking forward to it quite a lot. That seems to me like a rug-pull, and feels cruel.

To be clear, | don't believe either of my boys are among the children who will be disappointed with this.

Santa Claus has never been much of a part of our holiday traditions, and they have known since they were old enough to speak that he is just a mythical fantasy.

We still enjoy watching certain Santa based films and such, but that's the extent of it.

I am honestly not arguing for Santa visits. If a "no Santa" policy were instituted before holiday planning commenced, I would not have batted an eye, even if I think It is silly and a bit "ruin the fun".

I am certainly and vigorously arguing that taking something from students that they were promised is on its face wrong.

While I stated above that I would not bat an eye at a "no Santa" policy, I do have some thoughts on this specifically, and some more general thoughts that I am going to put down:

I think the idea of Santa being considered a religious figure is a bit of a stretch in modern culture. Even the foundations of the myth tying him to real Christian figures are tenuous and murky, and these foundations are at most barely referenced in the modern cultural representation (his alternate title "Saint Nick" being probably the only bit of this that endures at large). I understand that he is explicitly tied to Christmas, as opposed to any other religious holiday, but culturally this also seems like a weak argument to me.

Any serious and principled attempt to provide "equal time" to all winter holidays (or "all views" on anything) in school seems most likely to me to end with simply abolishing discussion or observation of any holiday, because it is an impossible standard to meet.

Someone will always feel like they and their beliefs or preferences are not being adequately represented.

As in broader society, the only practicable approach seems to be to make efforts to allow minority voices to be heard, not to silence the majority voices.

As you said, you have received complaints about the planned Santa visits. I find it unlikely that you received any unsolicited "Thanks for the upcoming Santa visits!" notes. Applying this more broadly, if a decision is being made on unsolicited feedback from parents, actively soliciting feedback from a broader group (of parents) seems like a very sensible thing. The bar for acting on such unsolicited feedback directly ought to be quite high ("My child is very allergic to Santa. If he visits my child's classroom, my child will go into anaphylaxis"). Even in such a scenario, the narrowest remedy ought to be sought ("Ok, we can do the Santa visit outside, and children who want to visit him can opt to go over, and children who don't can spend some time on the playground")

B. Principal report

- 1. Updates
 - a) Rppsevelt was hit hard with Covd after Thanksgiving break, up to 18 staff members tested positive - one class had 8 positive cases. All total, the number of cases created our first official public outbreak. As a result, we posted a sign on the door and received a visit from public health. Kudos to staff who covered in other roles to be sure we had the coverage we needed.
 - b) There will no longer be schoolwide Santa visits.
 - (1) For 15+ years, a volunteer Santa has visited classrooms on the Friday before break. The last such visit was 2019.
 Santa was also included among presenters in the zoom event in 2020.
- (2) Having a person coming to every class elevates Christmas above other holidays. Not about religion, rather about exposing kids to customs. The visits weren't an educational experience - all kids in Burbank know who Santa is. Issue isn't that Christmas shouldn't be discussed; there needs to be representation that's more balanced.
- (3) Santa visits may continue if we can identify others to come in and discuss other winter holidays. K & 1 took advantage of this already, other classrooms may as well. No other Burbank schools do Santa visits, and are still able to have a joyful holiday season - same goes for Roosevelt students who do not celebrate Christmas. Not meant to be taking anything away.

- a) Campus is currently in the next step of Fire Alarm improvements. Issue is that the main building and north wing system are not connected. Now the main building system is so antiquated so when we do drills it goes off day after day. It is being replaced; workers have been here for last week and a half. I notified staff first thing this morning and parents about an hour ago. So far, I've received about equal amounts of supportive and disappointed emails from parents and slightly more supportive emails from staff than disappointed.

The conversations I had with staff and families definitely led to passionate debate about how we recognize and celebrate diversity inclusively without families who celebrate traditional holidays feeling left out. There's an expected level of disagreement to have about this and I was prepared for some of it, but I'll be honest that this issue has definitely surpassed the amount of time I thought it would require to manage

Hi Emily,

I've copied Matt if you would like more info. Here is a summary from him.

In the past, it was really just a visit they did for fun. We haven't done it since Dec 2019 and I discontinued it this year because it elevated Christmas above other Winter Holidays. I explained to teachers that if they felt strongly about a visit, they needed to balance that by having someone (student, community member, family member, parent, etc) come talk about traditions from a non-Christmas celebration.

We've been careful to ensure neither the Santa visit nor the other presentations teach religion and instead teach customs and traditions. The Santa visits also discuss the tradition and often accompany readings of stories like <u>The Grinch</u>, <u>The Polar Express</u>, etc.

I had pushback from two teachers who felt I was either ruining Christmas or favoring non-Christian traditions over Christian. I've had either conversations or emails with 7 parents who also disagree for the same reasons.

Happy to fill you in more if you need additional info.

Here's the email I sent to staff about it (first two paragraphs are unrelated):

Hi All,

The stage risers will be moved from the stage to the Primary Playground next week where our Holiday Performances will be held. Upstairs teachers may need to adjust your line up spots accordingly if they are in your normal spot. I'll have two sound systems handy to test which one works best while you're rehearsing next week.

You probably noticed that the Auditorium is decorated for a holiday performance. This is for the Band/Orchestra performance <u>on Tues</u>, <u>Dec 20 at 6pm</u>. They're able to perform inside because the concert is outside of school hours and the rules for requiring and checking vaccination apply to events held during school hours, but not after school.

It's been a few years since we've hosted a Santa Claus visit and after much thought, I've decided to discontinue this schoowide practice based on a few factors:

• **Balancing Christmas with Other Winter Holidays**-You all do a great job of incorporating stories, art, lessons, and activities highlighting customs from Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, Las Posadas, Winter Solstice, etc as part of your instruction to teach about traditions from diverse cultures and people of different backgrounds. Teaching about Christmas traditions should be included in this, however a visit from Santa Claus disproportionately celebrates Christmas compared to other holidays.

- Consideration for What Students Already Know and Experience-I am confident that the majority, if not all, our students already know about Santa, have experiences visiting with Santa outside of school, and do not rely on a school-provided Santa visit. If families wish to have a Santa visit, there are many opportunities to do so outside of school.
- Many Other Ways to Teach About Traditions-As you talk about and do activities to teach about diverse holiday experiences, there are many ways to include Christmas traditions in a similar manner to how you teach about other holidays. A visit from Santa, while joyful, does not teach students anything new about holiday traditions.

If you feel strongly about hosting a Santa visit in your class, you need to arrange a visit from someone (community member, parent/family member, etc) who can speak about traditions of other holidays to balance a visit with Santa. If you need help with this, let me know.

If you plan to do this, please <u>notify me before next Fri, Dec 16</u> so that we can count your class in a Santa visit schedule.

The Board of Education uses a comprehensive process to adopt district instructional materials that is based on selection criteria established by law and Board policy and includes opportunities for the involvement of parents/guardians and community members. Complaints concerning the content or use of instructional materials, including textbooks, supplementary instructional materials, library materials, or other instructional materials and equipment, shall be properly and fairly considered using established complaint procedures.

Parents/guardians are encouraged to discuss any concerns regarding instructional materials with their child's teacher and/or the school principal. If the situation remains unresolved, a complaint may be filed using the process specified in the administrative regulation.

The district shall accept complaints concerning instructional materials only from staff, district residents, or the parents/guardians of children enrolled in a district school.

When deliberating upon challenged materials, the Superintendent and/or review committee shall consider the educational philosophy of the district, the professional opinions of teachers of the subject and of other competent authorities, reviews of the materials by reputable bodies, the teacher's stated objectives in using the materials, community standards, and the objections of the complainant.

Complainants are encouraged to accept the Superintendent's or review committee's decision. However, if the complainant finds that decision unsatisfactory, he/she may appeal the decision to the Board.

The district's decision shall be based on educational suitability of the materials and the criteria established in Board policy and administrative regulation.

When any challenged instructional material is reviewed by the district, it shall not be subject to further reconsideration for 12 months, unless the Superintendent determines that reconsideration is warranted.

Complaints related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials shall be resolved pursuant to the district's Williams uniform complaint procedure at AR 1312.4.

Step 1: Informal Complaint

If a staff member, district resident, or parent/guardian of a student enrolled in a district school has a complaint regarding the content or use of any specific instructional material, he/she shall informally discuss the material in question with the principal.

Step 2: Formal Complaint

If the complainant is not satisfied with the principal's initial response, he/she shall present a written complaint to the principal. Complaints regarding printed material shall name the author, title, and publisher and shall identify the objection by page and item numbers. In the case of nonprinted material, written information specifying the precise nature of the objection shall be given. Complainants shall sign all complaints and provide identifying information so that the district is able to make a proper reply. Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.

Upon receiving a complaint, the principal shall acknowledge its receipt and answer any questions regarding procedure. The principal then shall notify the Superintendent or designee and the teacher(s) involved of the complaint.

During the investigation of the complaint, the challenged material may remain in use until a final decision has been reached. However, upon request of the parent/guardian who has filed the complaint, his/her child may be excused from using challenged materials until a resolution has been reached. The teacher shall assign the student an alternate material of equal merit.

Step 3: Superintendent Determination

The Superintendent or designee shall determine whether a review committee should be convened to review the complaint.

If the Superintendent or designee determines that a review committee is not necessary, he/she shall issue a decision regarding the complaint.

Step 4: Review Committee

If the Superintendent or designee determines that a review committee is necessary, he/she shall appoint a committee composed of administrators and staff members selected from relevant instructional and administrative areas. The Superintendent or designee may also appoint community members to serve on the committee.

The review committee shall review the criteria specified in Board policy and shall determine the extent to which the challenged material supports the curriculum, the educational appropriateness of the material, and its suitability for the age level of the student.

Within 30 days of being convened, the review committee shall summarize its findings in a written report. The Superintendent or designee shall notify the complainant of the committee's decision within 15 days of receiving the committee's report.

Step 5: Appeal to the Board of Education

If the complainant remains unsatisfied, he/she may appeal the Superintendent's or the review committee's decision to the Board. The Board's decision shall be final.

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Policy 6141.2: Recognition Of Religious Beliefs And Customs

Status: ADOPTED

Original Adopted Date: 06/14/2007

The Board of Education recognizes that students' education would be incomplete without an understanding of the role of religion in society. As appropriate for a particular course, teachers may objectively discuss the influences of various religions, using religious works and symbols to illustrate their relationship with culture, literature or the arts. The Board expects that such instruction will identify principles common to all religions and foster respect for the diversity of religions and customs in the world.

(cf. 6143 - Courses of Study)

In order to respect each student's individual right to freedom of religious practice, religious indoctrination is clearly forbidden in the public schools. Instruction about religion shall not promote or denigrate the beliefs or customs of any particular religion or sect, nor should a preference be shown for one religious viewpoint over another. Staff members shall be highly sensitive to their obligation not to interfere with the religious development of any student in whatever tradition the student embraces.

As part of their official duties, staff shall not lead students in prayer or other religious activities. However, staff shall not prohibit or discourage any student from praying or otherwise expressing his/her religious belief as long as this does not disrupt the classroom.

Students may express their beliefs about religion in their homework, artwork and other class work if the expression is germane to the assignment. Such work shall be judged by accepted academic standards.

While teaching about religious holidays is a permissible part of the educational program, celebrating religious holidays is not allowed in the public schools. School-sponsored programs shall not be, nor have the effect of being, religiously oriented or a religious celebration. School and classroom decorations may express seasonal themes that are not religious in nature.

A student absence related to an observance of a religious holiday or ceremony shall be considered an excused absence. Make-up work shall be provided and accepted in a manner that is consistent with an absence due to illness or other excused absence.

Music, art, literature or drama programs having religious themes are permitted as part of the curriculum for schoolsponsored activities and programs If presented in an objective manner and as a traditional part of the cultural and religious heritage. The use of religious symbols that are part of a religious holiday is permitted as a teaching aid or resource provided that such symbols are displayed as an example of cultural and religious heritage of the holiday and are temporary in nature.

- The educational experience of discussing and learning about various holiday traditions, including Santa, can be done without experiencing a Santa visit.

Initially, I set a criteria allowing for a Santa visit if the class also had someone (parent, community member, etc) come to speak about another cultures holiday traditions so that there was balance between various celebrations. However, after consulting with our district leadership, we are not able to host any of these Santa visits.

This issue has been passionately discussed for the past two weeks. For those of you who have strong feelings either in favor of or opposed to a Santa visit at school, I appreciate the points-of view you have shared.

I know this decision will be frustrating for some and I'm sorry for the frustration. Despite our agreement or disagreement with this decision, I sincerely wish you and your family a happy holiday season.

There's an expected level of disagreement to have about this and I was prepared for some of it, but I'll be honest that this issue has definitely surpassed the amount of time I thought it would require to manage

Hi Emily,

I've copied Matt if you would like more info. Here is a summary from him.

In the past, it was really just a visit they did for fun. We haven't done it since Dec 2019 and I discontinued it this year because it elevated Christmas above other Winter Holidays. I explained to teachers that if they felt strongly about a visit, they needed to balance that by having someone (student, community member, family member, parent, etc) come talk about traditions from a non-Christmas celebration.

We've been careful to ensure neither the Santa visit nor the other presentations teach religion and instead teach customs and traditions. The Santa visits also discuss the tradition and often accompany readings of stories like <u>The Grinch</u>, <u>The Polar Express</u>, etc.

I had pushback from two teachers who felt I was either ruining Christmas or favoring non-Christian traditions over Christian. I've had either conversations or emails with 7 parents who also disagree for the same reasons.

Here's the email I sent to staff about it (first two paragraphs are unrelated):

Hi All,

.

The stage risers will be moved from the stage to the Primary Playground next week where our Holiday Performances will be held. Upstairs teachers may need to adjust your line up spots accordingly if they are in your normal spot. I'll have two sound systems handy to test which one works best while you're rehearsing next week.

You probably noticed that the Auditorium is decorated for a holiday performance. This is for the Band/Orchestra performance <u>on Tues</u>, <u>Dec 20 at 6pm</u>. They're able to perform inside because the concert is outside of school hours and the rules for requiring and checking vaccination apply to events held during school hours, but not after school.

It's been a few years since we've hosted a Santa Claus visit and after much thought, I've decided to discontinue this schoowide practice based on a few factors:

• **Balancing Christmas with Other Winter Holidays**-You all do a great job of incorporating stories, art, lessons, and activities highlighting customs from Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, Las Posadas, Winter Solstice, etc as part of your instruction to teach about traditions from diverse cultures and people of different backgrounds. Teaching about Christmas traditions should be included in this, however a visit from Santa Claus disproportionately celebrates Christmas compared to other holidays.

- **Consideration for What Students Already Know and Experience**-I am confident that the majority, if not all, our students already know about Santa, have experiences visiting with Santa outside of school, and do not rely on a school-provided Santa visit. If families wish to have a Santa visit, there are many opportunities to do so outside of school.
- Many Other Ways to Teach About Traditions-As you talk about and do activities to teach about diverse holiday experiences, there are many ways to include Christmas traditions in a similar manner to how you teach about other holidays. A visit from Santa, while joyful, does not teach students anything new about holiday traditions.

If you feel strongly about hosting a Santa visit in your class, you need to arrange a visit from someone (community member, parent/family member, etc) who can speak about traditions of other holidays to balance a visit with Santa. If you need help with this, let me know.

If you plan to do this, please <u>notify me before next Fri, Dec 16</u> so that we can count your class in a Santa visit schedule.

Not every kid is going to get what they want from Santa because their parents literally can't afford their requests.

Even Elf on the Shelf -- this has been taught and discussed in m, size 2nd-grade class, but I honestly don't see a reason this needs to be part of the curriculum.
